



Performance Highlights¹ for Hawaii

2003-2004

EDUCATION

(1 subgrantee reporting)
170 individuals participated in service-learning and community education activities.

ENVIRONMENT

(2 subgrantees reporting)
21,471 trees were planted throughout wild and park lands.
5,321 acres of park and wild lands were eradicated of 555 plants and replaced with native trees and flora.

HUMAN NEEDS

(1 subgrantee reporting)
67 individuals received information about risks, safety measures, or victimization prevention.
53 students benefited from counseling concerning school success and achievement.

PUBLIC SAFETY

(1 subgrantee reporting)
764 individuals benefited from counseling related to health and family matters.
712 individuals received emergency assistance.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(3 subgrantees reporting)
164 individuals volunteered at organized service days for the community.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(2 subgrantees reporting)
20 members were trained in CPR, first aid and emergency response.
20 members were trained in technical skills related to carrying out their assignments.
12 members received training in life skills such as organizational skills, problem solving, teamwork, leadership, and conflict resolution.

EDUCATION

(3 subgrantees reporting)
2,573 low-income individuals received information developed by members regarding legal aid.

ENVIRONMENT

(2 subgrantees reporting)
41 miles of trail were maintained or restored.
1,803 trees were planted in wildlands or park lands.
24,040 acres of wild or park lands were eliminated of environmental risks.

HUMAN NEEDS

(1 subgrantee reporting)
329 people were provided case management for health appointments or follow-up scheduling.
77 people were counseled regarding health and family matters.
60 people's specific support needs were assessed or identified.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING

(3 subgrantees reporting)
1,201 people benefited from community events, fairs, or benefits related to health or other human needs issues.
2,344 people benefited from service-learning and community education activities organized or conducted by members.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(3 subgrantees reporting)
86 volunteers were trained, placed, and followed up in providing a wide range of services.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(2 subgrantees reporting)
60 members were trained in technical skills related to carrying out their assignments.
15 members were trained in CPR, first aid, and emergency response.
15 members were trained in life skills, such as organizational skills, problem solving, teamwork, and leadership.

Data Source: All data are aggregates of the data subgrantees report in the AmeriCorps Progress Reports. State Commissions review subgrantees' reports, and then submit approved information to AmeriCorps through the Grantee Progress Reports (GPR). AmeriCorps programs vary in their start and end dates, and not all programs operate during the same timeframe. During any given year the time period of activity reported is between October 1st through September 30th. Any program activity that may have occurred after September 30, 2005 is not captured in this report.

¹ For Hawaii, all 2003-2004 performance highlights are based on Formula Award subgrantee self-report (total number of subgrantees for Hawaii in 2003-2004 was 5). For 2004-2005, all performance highlights are based on Formula and Competitive Award subgrantee self-report (total number of subgrantees for Hawaii in 2004-2005 was 8).







AmeriCorps State Members Serving in Hawaii Counties: 2004-05





AmeriCorps State Education Award Usage: 1994-2002¹



Education Award. After successfully completing a term of service, AmeriCorps members who are enrolled in the National Service Trust are eligible to receive an education award. The education award can be used to pay education costs at qualified institutions of higher education or training, or to repay qualified student loans. The award currently is \$4,725 for a year of full-time service, with correspondingly lesser awards for half-time and reduced half-time service. A member has up to seven years after his or her term of service has ended to use the award.

Education Award Usage. Education award usage is generated from eSpan. For education award usage rates, we examined awards in which members had 3 or more years to access the award. This decision was based on evidence that most members use the education award within 3 years of earning it.

For this report, we have identified members who served in 1994-1995 through 2001-2002 to examine usage rates for education awards.

1994-1995 through 1997-1998: Members who served in 1994-1995 through 1997-1998 have completed their seven-year education award eligibility period; because the eligibility period for using the education award is completed, we have aggregated the usage rate for these members.

1998-1999 through 2001-2002: Members who served in 1998-1999 through 2001-2002 have at least one year of eligibility left. As former members of these years access their education awards, these data will fluctuate as the awards remain active.

We will continue to track AmeriCorps member education award usage by year, adding an additional year in the “eligibility remaining” portion of the graph. Usage rates may differ from year to year as more earned education award money is withdrawn from members’ Trust accounts. As members end their seven-year period of eligibility they will be added to the “eligibility completed” group.
