



Performance Highlights¹ for Washington

2003-2004

EDUCATION

(6 subgrantees reporting)
 14,918 students in grades 1-12 received tutoring.
 2,405 people received job development counseling.
 1,384 in-class enrichment sessions were provided, benefiting 9,934 students.
 3,300 students benefited from service-learning or other community education activities.

HOMELAND SECURITY

(2 subgrantees reporting)
 94 people received information concerning homeland security risks and prevention.

HUMAN NEEDS

(3 subgrantees reporting)
 11,000 pounds of food and/or clothing were packed and organized by members for distribution.
 5 homes for low-income people were renovated, rehabilitated or completed.

PUBLIC SAFETY

(3 subgrantees reporting)
 3,232 people received anti-victimization counseling or training, or assistance in negotiating the justice system.
 14 programs in conflict mediation/resolution were conducted, benefiting 800 people.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING

(8 subgrantees reporting)
 782 students benefited from members organizing or conducting service-learning or community education activities.
 21 out-of-class enrichment sessions were provided, benefiting 3,049 students.
 35 homeless individuals were given shelter or vouchers for shelter.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(10 subgrantees reporting)
 30,670 volunteers were recruited to help with community programs.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(8 subgrantees reporting)
 581 members were trained in citizenship and civic responsibility.
 31 members were trained in CPR, first aid, and emergency response.

EDUCATION

(8 subgrantees reporting)
 5,063 people received job development counseling.
 19,889 students in grades 1-12 received tutoring.
 22 out-of-class enrichment activities were provided, benefiting 320 students.

ENVIRONMENT

(1 subgrantee reporting)
 5 miles of rivers, river banks, beaches and fish habitat were restored or conserved.
 66 environmental projects were completed, including repairing dams and planting 370,249 trees.

HUMAN NEEDS

(4 subgrantees reporting)
 9 low-income housing units were constructed for disabled or elderly residents.
 3 community buildings were rehabilitated or renovated, benefiting 154 people.
 129 parents or families received training on parenting skill development.
 Nearly 700 individuals were counseled regarding substance abuse prevention or related issues.

PUBLIC SAFETY

(1 subgrantee reporting)
 4 conflict resolution programs were provided in schools, benefiting over 1,800 people.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING

(12 subgrantees reporting)
 Members distributed information regarding community services to more than 500 people.
 208 youth completed a service-learning project based on a civic engagement curriculum.

VOLUNTEER LEVERAGING

(12 subgrantees reporting)
 51,283 volunteers were recruited for a wide range of educational and human needs services.

MEMBER DEVELOPMENT

(12 subgrantees reporting)
 786 members were trained in citizenship and civic responsibility.
 120 members were trained in CPR, first aid, and emergency response.

Data Source: All data are aggregates of the data subgrantees report in the AmeriCorps Progress Reports. State Commissions review subgrantees' reports, and then submit approved information to AmeriCorps through the Grantee Progress Reports (GPR). AmeriCorps programs vary in their start and end dates, and not all programs operate during the same timeframe. During any given year the time period of activity reported is between October 1st through September 30th. Any program activity that may have occurred after September 30, 2005 is not captured in this report.







AmeriCorps State Members Serving in Washington Counties: 2004-05





AmeriCorps State Education Award Usage: 1994-2002¹



Education Award. After successfully completing a term of service, AmeriCorps members who are enrolled in the National Service Trust are eligible to receive an education award. The education award can be used to pay education costs at qualified institutions of higher education or training, or to repay qualified student loans. The award currently is \$4,725 for a year of full-time service, with correspondingly lesser awards for half-time and reduced half-time service. A member has up to seven years after his or her term of service has ended to use the award.

Education Award Usage. Education award usage is generated from eSpan. For education award usage rates, we examined awards in which members had 3 or more years to access the award. This decision was based on evidence that most members use the education award within 3 years of earning it.

¹ For education award usage rates, we examined awards in which members have had three or more years to access the award. This decision was based on evidence that most members use the education award within three years of earning it.

For this report, we have identified members who served in 1994-1995 through 2001-2002 to examine usage rates for education awards.

1994-1995 through 1997-1998: Members who served in 1994-1995 through 1997-1998 have completed their seven-year education award eligibility period; because the eligibility period for using the education award is completed, we have aggregated the usage rate for these members.

1998-1999 through 2001-2002: Members who served in 1998-1999 through 2001-2002 have at least one year of eligibility left. As former members of these years access their education awards, these data will fluctuate as the awards remain active.

We will continue to track AmeriCorps member education award usage by year, adding an additional year in the “eligibility remaining” portion of the graph. Usage rates may differ from year to year as more earned education award money is withdrawn from members’ Trust accounts. As members end their seven-year period of eligibility they will be added to the “eligibility completed” group.
