



Domestic Violence





Part I Crime Reductions (compared to year before program began in target area)

Midtown (compared to 2008)	-19%	-23%	-35%	-40%	-42%	-51%	-54%
JEI (compared to 2009)			-3%	-8%	-9%	-7%	-29%
Southwest (compared to 2012)						+3%	0%
Osborn (compared to 2012)						-13%	-18%
UD (compared to 2012)						0%	-18%
Cody (compared to 2012)						-12%	-21%
MEC (compared to 2012)						-11%	-22%
COMBINED TOTAL - ALL 7 AREAS (compared to 2012)						-5%	-18%

In Midtown there has been a **54%** decrease for all major crimes through the end of 2015 (the last full calendar year). Currently **58%**, thru 9/15/2016.
