


View	Narration
	<p>This is Marvin.</p>
	<p>Marvin will be the first in his family to go to college. It's a scary thought.</p>
	<p>He has good grades, but he's not sure where he wants to go and what to study. Two years ago, his high school guidance counselor suggested AmeriCorps as a way to help the community and save for college while taking a year off from school. It would give Marvin time to decide what to do.</p>
	<p>Marvin enjoyed serving on his environmental team and signed up for a second term. He completed service with roughly \$10,000 in Education Award funds for college.</p>

	<p>In making his college decision, he knows he will use his Education Awards.</p>
	<p>But what schools will accept them? The award is valid at schools listed as Title IV.</p> <p>The Title IV list includes any public or private college or university that processes federal student aid like Stafford loans.</p>
	<p>The list includes many trade schools. And schools all over the world.</p>
	<p>He then learned about more schools that match the Education Award. The schools on this short list offer a scholarship for students who have performed national service. There are only a handful of matching schools, so if Marvin doesn't find an appealing option, he can go back to the broader Title IV list.</p>
