Greenville, SC	Institute for Child Success (Pay for Success)	This program will provide TA to help jurisdictions use PFS financing to improve outcomes for children and families. In 2014, ICS organized the first national conference on PFS for early childhood with the business organization ReadyNation. In 2015, ReadyNation, ICS and Pritzker Children's Initiative are planning to host a second annual conference in Chicago, where participants are chosen through an open competition. ICS proposes to leverage the Pritzker Children's Initiative's investment in this conference and provide technical assistance to 12 teams over 3 years with a goal of yielding 5 early childhood PFS deals in 5 years. Technical assistance for each jurisdiction will last 9 to 12 months and will use an innovative coaching model, where Sub-Recipients will commit specified staff to the project and ICS will coach and assist them to analyze feasibility, convene stakeholders and otherwise assess and prepare for PFS financing. Partnering with the Nonprofit Finance Fund, ICS will also build capacity of early childhood service providers.
Greenville, SC	United Way of Greenville County	United Way of Greenville County will design a dropout prevention program for middle grade students. The program will use an Early Warning Response System, real-time data to identify students who begin to disengage from school. A team will then match students with appropriate interventions and resources

Greenville, SC	Greenville Region Workforce Collaborative/United Way of Greenville County Jobs for the Future, Inc./National Fund for Workforce Solutions	Through employer input and program alignment, the Greenville Regional Funder Collaborative is assisting job seekers in attaining the required knowledge in advanced manufacturing, and helping employers hire qualified workers.
Charleston, SC	WINGS for Kids The Edna McConnell Clark Foundation	WINGS promotes social and emotional learning (SEL) in an afterschool setting, helping K-6 children regulate emotions, increase self-awareness, and improve their ability to get along with peers, leading to increased school attendance. The 30 components in the WINGS SEL curriculum include creating a caring community, academic support and tutoring, and community service, all focused on strengthening students' attachment to school. A SIF grant will help WINGS expand into rural South Carolina, increase the number of youth served in Charleston, SC and Atlanta, GA, bolster an already strong RCT design that will bring the organization to a proven level of evidence within the SIF time frame, and, as appropriate, help build WINGS' management and development capacity to support additional growth. WINGS currently serves 650 children at six sites and will serve an additional 990 youth a minimum of 10 -13 sites, including at least one replication in rural South Carolina during the course of the investment. WINGS is well-positioned to take advantage of mounting interest in SEL and to contribute to the youth development and education reform fields significant knowledge about the role a well-structured SEL afterschool program can play in helping children develop skills that research links to improved academic performance and longer-term success in life.
