MEETING COMMUNITY NEEDS IN SOUTH CAROLINA

More than 6,700 people of all ages and backgrounds are helping to meet local needs, strengthen communities, and increase civic engagement through national service in South Carolina. Serving at more than 580 locations throughout the state, these citizens tutor and mentor children, support veterans and military families, provide health services, restore the environment, respond to disasters, increase economic opportunity, and recruit and manage volunteers.

This year, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) will commit more than \$12,630,000 to support South Carolina communities through national service initiatives. CNCS invests in cost-effective community solutions--working hand in hand with local partners to improve lives, expand economic opportunity, and engage citizens in solving problems in their communities. Serving in many of the state's most impoverished communities, CNCS provides vital support to schools, food banks, homeless shelters, community health clinics, youth centers, veterans service facilities, and other nonprofit and faith-based organizations at a time of growing demand for services. Through a unique public-private partnership, this federal investment will leverage an additional \$3,820,000 in other resources to strengthen community impact, build local support, and increase return on taxpayer dollars.

AmeriCorps: This year AmeriCorps will provide more than 980 individuals the opportunity to provide intensive, results-driven service to meet education, environmental, health, economic, and other pressing needs in communities across South Carolina. Most AmeriCorps grant funding goes to the United Way Association of South Carolina, which in turn awards grants to nonprofit groups to respond to local needs. Most of the remainder of the grant funding is distributed by CNCS directly to multi-state and national organizations through a competitive grants process. Other individuals serve through AmeriCorps VISTA, whose members help bring individuals and communities out of poverty by serving full-time to fight illiteracy, improve health services, create businesses, and increase housing opportunities, and AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps), a 10-month, full time residential program for men and women between the ages of 18 and 24. In exchange for their service, AmeriCorps members earn an education award that can be used to pay for college or to pay back qualified student loans. Since 1994, more than 9,500 South Carolina residents have served more than 11 million hours and have qualified for Segal AmeriCorps Education Awards totaling more than \$22,190,000.

Senior Corps: More than 5,700 seniors in South Carolina contribute their time and talents in one of three Senior Corps programs. Foster Grandparents serve one-on-one as tutors and mentors to more than 2,200 young people who have special needs. Senior Companions help more than 510 homebound seniors and other adults maintain independence in their own homes. RSVP volunteers conduct safety patrols, renovate homes, protect the environment, tutor and mentor youth, respond to natural disasters, and provide other services through more than 180 groups across South Carolina.

Social Innovation Fund: The Social Innovation Fund transforms lives and communities using limited federal investment as a catalyst to grow the impact of nonprofits with evidence of strong results. It harnesses the expertise of grantmaking intermediaries to identify, evaluate and expand effective nonprofits and engages funding partners to contribute nearly three dollars to every one federal dollar invested. As the Social Innovation Fund network grows programs that work in South Carolina, more people are able to overcome their most pressing challenges in the areas of economic opportunity, health, and youth development. The Social Innovation Fund is investing more than \$100,000 in expanding the impact of 2 nonprofits in South Carolina, selected and supported by 2 intermediaries.

AmeriCorps State

Claflin University's Saturday Academy is an example of a South Carolina AmeriCorps program that is achieving great impact. The program serves a population of students who often have little support at home and have been accustomed to spending their weekends alone, and in some cases, hungry. The program provides an opportunity for these students to be transported to a college campus every Saturday where they receive lunch and participate in a tutoring/mentoring experience with a college student. This program model not only positively impacts the students it serves, but also positively impacts its 50 AmeriCorps members. The program's members have gone on to become teachers, assist in graduate research, and run their own AmeriCorps programs. The program has consistency tracked that 80 percent of the students who complete the program have increased their reading and writing scores on standardized tests. Furthermore, the program recently added a parental involvement component and, in the first year of implementation, substantially exceeded its parent-engagement goal.

Last year, South Carolina's programs engaged 16,336 students in educational services, provided financial literacy assistance to 1,286 clients, and recruited 2,956 volunteers. Without these services, many students would struggle to reach their academic potential, parents would have increased challenges providing for their families, and our communities would be less pleasant areas to live. The collective impact that South Carolina AmeriCorps programs have made in the area of education can be further demonstrated by data indicating that 11,083 students served by AmeriCorps members showed academic improvement in either literacy or math.

AmeriCorps National

Reading Partners is dedicated to helping children become lifelong readers by empowering community volunteers to provide individualized instruction that produces measurable results. The program's vision is that all children in Charleston will have the literacy skills they need to reach their full potential. In 2013-14, AmeriCorps members served 246 students with the help of almost 400 volunteers in 6 schools across Charleston. The program exceeded expectations with 72 percent of target students accelerating their rate of learning. On average, students more than doubled their rates of learning. Further, 58 percent of target students narrowed their literacy gaps with their peers who read at grade level. Reading Partners currently engages a group of 15 AmeriCorps members in service to manage reading centers, provide one-on-one literacy tutoring, recruit volunteers, and build capacity. In 2014-15, AmeriCorps members are on track to help serve 500 students in 12 schools with the help of approximately 700 volunteer tutors. The program is increasing the number of students they are working with by 100 percent in South Carolina with the help of our AmeriCorps members.

AmeriCorps VISTA

United Way of the Piedmont's VISTA project works to increase access to behavioral health services and to aid those living in poverty achieve financial stability. The Behavioral Health team focuses on expanding client access to an existing volunteer life-coach program, on developing a model for peer accountability for behavioral health and substance abuse clients, and by publishing a referral and resource opportunity listing. The Financial Stability team focuses on addressing housing challenges in the Piedmont community by establishing a common intake application for emergency food and shelter organizations and by researching family life-coach program models that support financial stability. Start-up funding of \$5,000 was recently granted by a local corporation thanks to the efforts of the VISTA project. Funding supports the development of a financial stability and savings incentive program in which families may elect to enroll by committing \$25 per month for a savings plan. With evidence of their monthly success in making deposits to build a savings fund, family savings will be matched at the end of the year, up to \$300, for a total savings of \$600.

AmeriCorps VISTA members at the Charleston Area Service Collaborative address pressing community needs in health, education, and veteran initiatives at 22 sites throughout Charleston. Over the past year, 24 VISTA members and two VISTA leaders have built tremendous local capacity at their sites, recruiting 2,668 volunteers and managing more than 5,500. VISTA members have also generated \$156,026 in cash and grant funding, and \$261,726 of in-kind donations. New partnerships include several national corporations such as Boeing, Coca Cola, and Blackbaud. VISTA members provided training and technical assistance to 1,700 staff members and community volunteers over the past year. For example, a VISTA member at a local food bank designed a nutrition education program that will be implemented over the next four years with clients at the food bank and partner agencies. Another VISTA member developed a resource directory for veterans in the Charleston area that is now being shared through the Veterans Administration and other veteran organizations in Charleston. The project is managed by Charleston's Mayor's Office of Children, Youth and Families.

AmeriCorps NCCC

An AmeriCorps NCCC team worked with The Youth Academy Inc. to provide a safe place for children to come throughout the summer months. The mission of The Youth Academy Inc., is to assist in bridging the gap of disparities between economically disadvantaged children and their families, and their adjustments to the five main institutions in society (home, school, church, government and society). When the NCCC team arrived at the project site, team mentored children and helped provide these children with positive outlets throughout the summer. Concurrently, the team cleared a total of 1,400 pounds of debris and trash from a fire that had occurred on the farm. Once The Youth Academy Inc.'s summer camp began, the Team Leader (TL) focused attention on working directly with the special needs children who were mild to severely autistic. The TL helped serve both breakfast and lunch to summer campers each day at the camp, totaling about 1000 meals served overall. Also, the NCCC team prepared water slides, an inflatable pool, and constructed an 80-foot fence for a "Beach Country Carnival" for the summer campers to enjoy.

An AmeriCorps NCCC team worked with the Francis Marion National Forest fire team in South Carolina to help with prescribed burns. The prescribed burns help reduce the size, intensity, and likelihood of wildfires. The team surpassed expectations helping with approximately 14,006 acres of prescribed burns and 66 acres of wildfire suppression. They played a role in many different aspects of each burn including the use of drip torches for ignition of fire lines, hand tools to prep units, and utility task vehicles and engines to hold line. The NCCC team also assisted with clearing 4,000 pounds of tree debris from 21.25 acres of campgrounds, prepping 25 acres of burn units, rehabbing 39 fire tools, and assisting with clearing 500 pounds of trash from one building where future volunteers will be housed. Additionally, the team was able to work with the organization I Heart Hungry Kids for Global Youth Service Day where they assisted children with the assembly of food bags that would be distributed to other children in need across coastal South Carolina. The team gained numerous leadership, situational awareness, communication and problem-solving skills within this work environment.

Senior Corps Foster Grandparent Program

Senior Resources is a nonprofit organization that coordinates services, provides resources and encourages the personal choices that allow Midland's area senior citizens to remain independent. Their services touch the lives of more than 4,000 Midlands residents. Last year, 102 Foster Grandparents served 79,497 hours, mentoring and tutoring 741 children at 33 stations in schools, Head Start programs, and child development centers. A recent year-end survey showed that more than 96 percent of students assigned to Foster Grandparents showed significant improvement in attitude and interest, leading to improved academic skills. More than 97 percent advanced to the next grade. Among a separate group of students with severe cognitive and physical disabilities served by Foster Grandparents, 100 percent showed significant improvement in attitude and interest, leading to improved academic skills.

Senior Corps RSVP

United Way of the Piedmont's Spartanburg County RSVP program serves as a conduit for volunteer and financial resources for more than 25 nonprofit organizations in Spartanburg. RSVP of Spartanburg County has more than 200 active volunteers focused on mentoring and tutoring, delivering health care services, preparing taxes for the low income and elderly, writing letters to active duty military personnel, and delivering and serving meals in soup kitchens. RSVP volunteers served on the planning committee for the second annual Upstate Stand Down held October 9th. This one-day event offers services to homeless veterans including medical screens, flu shots, employment and housing opportunities, as well as showers, haircuts, and other basic necessities. In total, more than \$125,000 in services were delivered to the veterans, including \$17,000 in dental extractions. The 2014 Stand Down served 437 veterans and needy family members including children. The event brought together over 440 volunteers who contributed 6,012 hours.

Senior Corps Senior Companion Program

The Senior Companion program serving Charleston, SC, offers independent living support to isolated, frail, or homebound elderly clients every year, delaying or preventing institutional care. In the past year, Senior Companion volunteers have provided such support to 71 clients, and at the end of the year, more than 50% of those served continued to live independently in their own homes. One client was diagnosed with cancer and is undergoing chemotherapy. The side effects of the treatment make it difficult for the client to maintain her normal routine. Her Senior Companion takes her to medical appointments, makes a light breakfast or lunch, if needed, or simply sits and reads with the client when she is feeling too sick to do anything else. The client's extended family expressed gratitude for the Senior Companion's support which enables each member of the family to maintain his full-time employment.
