Building upon a strong state movement for reform and with strong bipartisan support from Colorado's Governor, Lieutenant Governor and state legislature, Mile High United Way is poised to introduce key transformations in Colorado's education system. Denver, CO	Clayton Early Learning Mile High United Way	Clayton Early Learning's Ready to Read program uses Dialogic Reading and Cradling Literacy in center-based and Play and Learn settings to provide early childhood educators, families and volunteers the necessary skills to help increase children's oral language and vocabulary skills in schools and at home.
Denver, CO	Reading Partners Mile High United Way	Reading Partners measurably improves reading skills and life opportunities for hundreds of children across Colorado and provides a meaningful, structured method for community volunteers to engage with their local schools by providing one-on-one tutoring opportunities with elementary school children.
Denver, CO	Summit54 Mile High United Way	By harnessing the power of summer learning, Summit 54's Summer Advantage USA program raises the educational achievement of students in grades K-3 offering rigorous academic instruction, enrichment, healthy meals, inspirational guest speakers and field trips to landmarks and universities during the summer.
Denver, CO	The Bridge Project Mile High United Way	The Bridge Project provides early literacy intervention to children living in public housing neighborhoods through quality instruction and one-to-one volunteer tutor relationships.
Greenwood Village, CO	Colorado Humanities Mile High United Way	Colorado Humanities' Motherread/Fatheread Colorado program augments children's school readiness and optimizes their literacy skills and ongoing success in school by helping to create a reading environment in the home and increasing the frequency and quality of being read to by parents, childcare providers and early childhood educators.
Westminster, CO	Colorado Statewide Parent Coalition Mile High United Way	Colorado Statewide Parent Coalition's Providers Advancing School Outcomes (PASO) program is designed to train and support Family, Friend, and Neighbor (FFN) providers to increase the quality of education and care for preschool-aged children, especially in low-income Hispanic communities. PASO will enhance the capacity of these FFN providers to ensure school readiness of Latino children, birth to five years of age.



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Denver, CO	Enterprise Community Partners, in partnership with Corporation for Supportive Housing Nonprofit Finance Fund	Housing to Health Initiative, led by subgrantee Enterprise Community Partners, Inc. in partnership with CSH and Social Impact Solutions, will provide supportive housing to 300 chronically homeless individuals in Denver, Colorado with the goals of improving the quality of life for these individuals and reducing frequent, high-cost utilization of criminal justice and emergency health services.
Denver, CO	Nurse Family Partnership Nonprofit Finance Fund	Nurse-Family Partnership, in partnership with Social Finance, is exploring a project to expand the reach of its pre- and post-natal home visiting program in Michigan. Nurse-Family Partnership's services have improved maternal and child health outcomes and family economic self-sufficiency for thousands of families across the country.
Boulder, CO	Mental Health Partners University of Utah Policy Innovation Lab	The Boulder County Homelessness Systems Improvement Collaborative (HSIC) is a new collaborative partnership representing Mental Health Partners, Boulder Housing Partners, and Boulder Homeless Services Collaborative. The pilot initiative was developed to improve data infrastructure and sharing capacity among Boulder County providers that work with individuals experiencing homelessness. Modeling the partnership off Boulder County's continuum of care, HSIC will create a microcosm of the continuum that utilizes three promising interventions from its member providers. The new collaborative intervention is aimed at reducing chronic and temporary homelessness for individuals who have a diagnosed or suspected behavioral health issue.
Denver, CO	State of Colorado Department of Homeless Initiatives University of Utah Policy Innovation Lab	The State of Colorado is developing a feasibility study exploring the potential for a Pay for Success approach to scaling up its existing Colorado Second Chance Housing and Re-entry Program (C-SHARP). C-SHARP is aimed at reducing recidivism rates by providing supportive housing to dual diagnosed (substance abuse and mental illness) former offenders.
Fort Collins, CO	SummitStone Health University of Utah Policy Innovation Lab	The Larimer County Cohort is a new collaborative partnership led by SummitStone Health with Larimer County, Fort Collins Housing Authority, the Health District of Northern Larimer County, and Homeward 2020. Pairing high-quality behavioral health and housing interventions with government and health district services, their partnership hopes to target individuals experiencing mental health and/or substance use disorders who have a high utilization of community health and acute/crisis services.
Westminster, CO	Adams County School District 50, CO University of Utah Policy Innovation Lab	Adams County School District 50 is developing a feasibility study exploring the potential for a Pay for Success approach to improving school readiness for kindergarteners in the school district. Adams County School District 50 wants to model its intervention after well developed and documented programs that include home visitation, parent support and high quality preschool. Specifically, the School District aims to target a high poverty region in SW Adams County where school readiness for kindergarten is presently 29%. Kindergarten readiness in the District as a whole averages 41%.
Denver, CO	Colorado Rapids Youth Soccer Club US Soccer Foundation	Through this Soccer for Success program, over 1,100 youth are provided with physical activity, nutrition education, mentorship, and family engagement opportunities that combat childhood obesity and promote healthy lifestyles.
