New York, NY	The Edna McConnell Clark Foundation	The Edna McConnell Clark Foundation (EMCF), in collaboration with the Bridgespan Group and MDRC, provide financial, strategic planning and evaluation support to a current portfolio of nine youth development and school support nonprofit organizations working in both urban and rural communities throughout the nation. These subgrantees help youth ages 9-24: 1) improve their educational skills and academic achievement; 2) prepare for the world of work and make the transition to employment and economic independence; and, 3) avoid high-risk behaviors such as criminal activity and teen pregnancy. Over the last decade, EMCF has implemented a grant making approach that identifies highly-promising nonprofits serving disadvantaged youth from low-income communities and makes large, long-term investments to strengthen their evidence base and replicate and expand them so they can serve more young people. At the heart of this approach is a multi-year business plan that guides an organization's development. EMCF will donate the cost of formulating such business plans. To help facilitate expansion into new target geographies, co-investors will assist with the identification and selection of nonprofit organizations.

## Nonprofit Subgrantees in New York

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New York, NY	Amida Care AIDS United	AmidaCONNECT utilizes an Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) model in employing three field-based Mobile Engagement Teams (METs) to provide intensive outreach, care navigation, case management and reengagement services to the most difficult to reach HIV-positive population – those dually and triply diagnosed with mental health and/or substance use issues that are unconnected to care (or at risk of becoming disconnected from care) – and connect them to long term community service providers. The enrollees of AmidaCONNECT are not only living with HIV and un/under treated, but are often facing additional challenges that affect overall health and well-being, such as homelessness, poverty, lack of nutritious food and legal issues. The METs engage members in appropriate and ongoing primary and behavioral health care and substance use treatment in an effort to suppress HIV viral load, reduce health disparities and generate positive health outcomes, while decreasing the utilization of costly hospitalizations and long term care that is often preventable.
Hauppauge, NY	Long Island Housing Partnership Capital Impact Partners	Long Island Housing Partnership (LIHP) is building a body of evidence for how shared equity affordable ownership models contribute to neighborhood stability, affordability, and participants' long term economic well-being. LIHP is exploring multiple models of long-term affordable homeownership on Long Island.



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Albany, NY	New York State Department of Health Corporation for Supportive Housing (PFS)	The State of New York is part of a cohort of state governments all interested in the use of the PFS model to provide persons residing in institutional settings with the opportunity to transition to community-based supportive housing. CSH's work with New York State will focus on providing supportive housing to individuals who have spent at least one hundred and twenty consecutive days in a nursing home setting and who have the ability to live safely in the community. The geography is the State of New York including New York City. CSH and the HKS SIB Lab are collaborating to provide a joint cohort-based model of technical assistance.
Buffalo, NY	Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo Green & Healthy Homes Initiative	Heart of the City Neighborhoods, Inc. and the Community Foundation for Greater Buffalo (partners of the Green & Healthy Homes Initiative) lead a collective group of service providers efficiently coordinating weatherization, home health and safety interventions. The collaborative has provided comprehensive services to almost 400 families in recent years.
Pittsford, NY	Monroe Plan for Medical Care (Managed Care Organization) Green & Healthy Homes Initiative	Monroe Plan for Medical Care is a not-for-profit entity and a risk-bearing Independent Practice Association (IPA) meeting the healthcare needs of low-income individuals for more than 40 years. Monroe Plan for Medical Care has a long history of initiatives to improve asthma care for its members while aligning financial incentives for stakeholders.
New York, NY	Single Stop (GLF) GreenLight Fund	With its subgrant to Single Stop USA, GreenLight's SIF Initiative is supporting the expansion of its program services, which provide financial assistance to students through a connection with existing, scalable public resources, to Philadelphia, PA. Single Stop expects to serve over 31,000 students during the five-year engagement. Single Stop has partnered with the Community College of Philadelphia (CCP) to provide students and their families free on-campus services and access to additional community resources such as tax preparation, financial counseling, and legal services that help students stay enrolled in school. By using its web-based screening platform and case management system, the Benefits Enrollment Network (BEN), community college staff can quickly determine student eligibility for a range of public benefits and services, including food stamps, health insurance, tax credits and other benefits. Single Stop not only helps students access financial resources and benefits, but also provides critical support services and capacity building to the executive leadership teams and boards of college partners as well as data analysis services to operations personnel. As a result of the Social Innovation Fund, Single Stop has been able to expand its services significantly and in 2011 alone, it helped more than 140,000 families and students access more than \$425 million in benefits and services. These numbers indicate that Single Stop at community colleges is a powerful intervention that works to alleviate poverty in the short term by providing students and their families with access to critical benefits and services that supplement their income and in the long run by helping students stay in school and graduate, thus increasing lifetime earnings. Single Stop's expansion to Philadelphia through GreenLight's SIF Initiative will accelerate its continued growth nationally. The committed matching support from CCP (\$1M over five years) will support Single Stop's strategy of increasing college investment in its services and the GreenLight award will provide the opportunity to conduct an impact evaluation to confirm how Single Stop affects students' academic success in three particular ways: credit accumulation, persistence, and degree completion.



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New York, NY	Year Up (GLF) GreenLight Fund	With its subgrant to Year Up, GreenLight's SIF Initiative is supporting the expansion of its Professional Training Corps (PTC) to Philadelphia, PA, which combines skills training, college credit accumulation, and career trajectory work experience for low-income young adults. Year Up aims to serve 1,200 young adults (ages 18-24) in Philadelphia over the five-year engagement. Year Up's PTC resides in two-year colleges and provides the opportunity for a cohort of fulltime college students to earn credits by engaging in a year-long program that begins with PTC coursework and is followed by a six-month, fulltime internship in a professional-sector career. PTC aims to meet student outcome targets that include employer satisfaction, college graduation, job placement, and attaining long-term financial sustainability. Year Up's expansion of its PTC to Philadelphia through the GreenLight SIF Initiative is part of its "Million Person Model" strategy focused on scaling to serve 100,000 low-income, minority young adults per year by putting them on a clear pathway to obtaining a degree a developing relevant professional skills. Year Up's traditional program model has been proven to boost a young adult's annual earnings by an average of 30 percent. As PTC is an adaptation of that model, the SIF evaluation will help to develop a differentiated research base to test how the adaptation impacts success. The evaluation will also lend key evidence to the fields of college persistence and employment by identifying the impact of college engagement and internship experience on various employment outcomes, including wages and career trajectory.
